October meeting:

Bill Irving gave a talk about his experience with 'DNA testing'. As we all know, there is a growing interest in DNA testing to help people find their ancestors and learn more about their origins. As genealogists, this seems like an exciting next step for many of us.

Bill explained what DNA is, how it shows connections between people and what is involved in testing. The main aim for genealogists is to find an ancestor that you share in common with other people around the world. Your test reveals markers that you can compare with other peoples' results.



In Bill's case he found others with the same markers as him which lead to finding an ancestor hundreds of years ago in Scotland. This was further back than he had been able to trace in other ways. He also found out interesting things like a link back to Spain, so he now knows some of his ancestors came from there. This confirmed a family story of Spanish origins.

There are many companies now offering this service. Their services and reliability vary. In Bill's case his tests were proved to be pretty good because they fitted what he already knew about his family origins. He was happy with the company he chose but advised caution in choosing one to do your testing.

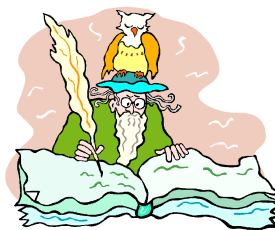

ELTHAM & DISTRICT HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The EHS was formed in 1972 when a group of enthusiastic Eltham residents called a meeting in the Town Hall. They undertook the task of creating an Eltham archive in preparation for Eltham's Centennial, which was only a few years away.

Since then the Society's collection of old photos and documents pertaining to the Eltham district's history, has continued to grow.

A safe storage space for the old Eltham Argus newspapers was the members' first concern and the Society's first home was located above the Municipal Chambers in Stanners St.

In September 1999 the Society moved into its new home at the old Bank of New South Wales, thanks to a generous grant from the Taranaki Electricity Trust.

Their resource library holds many valuable research resources including:

Cemetery transcriptions, directories, files on local businesses and clubs, family trees, photo collections and files, school histories, military information for WW1 & WW2.

They also have a large collection of newspapers, some of which are indexed.

Research services are available.

The society rooms are at the corner of York and Bridge streets.
Opening hours are: Thursday 1-3.30 pm & Friday 1-3.30pm or by arrangement.
