Our branch rooms are open on Saturday mornings, from 10am to noon.






Convenor's Report

Well, Covid has managed to put another spanner in the works and make life just that much harder. Because of this, after much discussion, the Committee has reluctantly decided to postpone the September meeting. Hopefully by October things will have returned to the old new normal and we will be able to finish 2020 without Covid interfering again.

Just a note that the library is still open on Saturday mornings from 10am till 12. We will keep it at Saturday's only for the rest of this year at least. At the moment committee members are manning it but if there is anyone else that would like to volunteer for the odd Saturday, please let myself or Lea know.

As previously reported, we recently received a donation of books that had belonged to Ron Stretton. Many of them have been integrated into our library, but two of these books caught my attention. They are a two volume set of books entitled *Castles and Abbeys of England*, by William Beattie MD. They are beautiful old books published mid 19th century, and are in wonderful condition considering their age.

But the main thing that caught my eye, was the notation on the inside cover of both saying: "May 17th 1865, To John Channing Buckland, A present from his Aunt Eliza Buckland on his twenty first birthday".



My first thought was: Who is John Channing Buckland? My second thought was if these books belonged in my family, I'd want them back. So I set out to discover who this family was. Here is his abbreviated life:

JOHN CHANNING BUCKLAND

John Channing Buckland was born in Auckland on 17 May 1844 to Susan (nee Channing) and William Thorne Buckland. He was the eldest of their ten children. He was educated at Dr Kinder's Grammar School and St John's College. He served in Colonel Nixon's Mounted Rifles in the Waikato Wars.

On 17 Dec 1867 he married Caroline, daughter of the Rev W Fairburn in Auckland. They settled in Otahuhu where they were farming.

By 1875 the family had moved to Otago where they took up the Tumai Estate near Waikouaiti, and subsequently Lake Taieri Station. John was a member of the Waikouaiti County Council and also represented Waikouaiti in Parliament from 1884 – 1887. In 1899 he sold his Otago Interests and bought the Mount Bossu estate sheep farm at Wainui. He served on the Akaroa Council for four years before ill health prevented him from standing again.

John and Caroline had seven children. John died on 4 April 1909, six weeks short of his 65th birthday at his homestead *The Glen*. Caroline died on 9 April 1934. They are buried at Akaroa along with their daughter Caroline Mariamne who died in 1930.

The Buckland family was prominent in New Zealand affairs with John's father William Thorne and his

brother William Francis also becoming Members of Parliament in the late 1800s. William Francis also served as Mayor of Cambridge for about ten years.

If there are any family members out there who would like to recover these books, I would be delighted to return them to their rightful owners.
