DNA Session January 2023


In January, we started the year with a DNA session. Sharyn Guthrie explained some techniques for using DNA results to help with genealogy.

Sharyn explained a way of organising matches in a spreadsheet, to better show the relationships to your known matches.

Sometimes, DNA can bring up unexpected results, such as a biological parent not being the person who we thought was the parent. We watched a <u>short YouTube video</u> in which actress Julia Roberts finds that her paternal surname isn't really Roberts, if you go back a couple of generations.

Sharon showed us the <u>WATO tool</u> from <u>dnapainter.com</u>. When you have a DNA match and want to work out where the person fits in the family tree, the WATO tool helps by calculating the probabilities that the person could be at certain places in the tree.

Sharyn also demonstrated the <u>shared cM project</u> <u>tool</u>. For a given cM match, this tool shows the likely relationships, such as second or third cousin, etc.

- You can wear a face mask at the society rooms.


